

Survey Background

In July of 2009, the Connecticut General Assembly passed Special Act 09-12, requiring the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to make recommendations concerning the maximum boat length and motor size permitted on Candlewood Lake. The DEP reviewed existing data regarding lake use and conducted additional research to aid in making a policy suggestion. In August of 2009 DEP staff conducted a count of all vessels docked and moored on the lake.



In addition to this data, DEP staff felt it was necessary to solicit users of the lake for their comments and opinions before making any proposals. A survey was developed by Boating Division staff based on a similar study of recreational issues impacting Lake George in New York. The *Lake George Recreation Study Plan* was completed in 2006 by a private research firm, Adirondack Research, for the Lake George Park Commission. The survey was reviewed by representatives from each town surrounding the lake, the Candlewood Lake Authority (CLA) and several DEP employees making up a panel tasked with making the recommendations. The survey was distributed online, at marinas, boat launches, and even by on water contacts with DEP staff beginning in the first week of September. The DEP accepted surveys postmarked no later than October 7th 2009.

It is important to note the statistical limitation of this survey. The results don't attempt to represent a true account of boating activity and opinions of all users of the lake. The survey was made available online and handed out to anyone who wished to comment. A scientific survey would target a random sample of the actual Candlewood Lake boating population. This methodology would have employed a statistical design for sampling lake users by group, weighted responses, evaluated non-response bias, and extrapolated survey data to represent overall lake use and opinions of different user groups. Since the data is not a random sample, a test of statistical significance between user groups' responses was not completed. Given these limitations, the data presented in this report should be interpreted with caution.

Section 1: Survey Respondents and Lake Use

The DEP received close to 600 surveys from users of Candlewood Lake. After a quick review for completeness (all four pages of survey received) and post marked by the proper date, 557 of the surveys were entered into an Access database. Of the 557 surveys entered into the database, 21 of the survey respondents did not answer question 4 regarding their type of residence in relation to the lake. These surveys were not included in the analysis because many of the questions were to be grouped by 'residence' during analysis. These requirements yielded a total of 536 usable surveys. In the tables included in this report, the overall percent of respondents is based on the total of 536 surveys received. Further analysis by user groups (explained below) was calculated based on the breakdown of respondents by their residence. These totals are listed in Table 1.1 on the following page.

Lake User Groups

Survey respondents were asked to identify their summer residence in location to Candlewood Lake. The majority of surveys received were from those whose summer residences were either lakefront

or in a town surrounding the lake (Brookfield, Danbury, Sherman, New Fairfield, or New Milford) but do not have direct lake access from their property. Four users groups were established based on residence of the respondent: Lakefront, Town Bordering Candlewood Lake (CL), Non Border Connecticut Town, and Out of State.

A high percentage of survey respondents across all users groups had 5 or more years boating experience on Candlewood Lake.

When asked about their awareness of current speed regulations, most respondents (about 89%) felt they had a great deal or some awareness of the current speed restrictions on Candlewood Lake.

Boats Used on Candlewood Lake:

Survey respondents owned 1,027 boats that were used on Candlewood Lake in 2009. Sixty-four percent (661) of these vessels were motorized and thirty-six percent (366) were non-motorized. Overall, respondents owned an average of 1.9 boats.

Boat ownership between user groups was varied. Lakefront respondents typically owned an average of 2.6 boats while other user groups only owned 1.1 - 1.6 boats. 30% of lakefront respondents reported owning at least one Personal Water Craft (PWC) that was used on Candlewood Lake in 2009.

Out of state respondents almost always used a motorized vessel on Candlewood Lake. Only .04% of out of state respondents reported owning and using a non-motorized vessel on Candlewood Lake in 2009. The out of state user group was the second highest group to own and use PWC's on the lake. 12.5% owned and used a PWC on the lake in 2009.

Characteristics of Motorized Boat Most Used

Respondents were asked to describe the boat they owned and used <u>most</u> during the summer of 2009 on Candlewood Lake. Overall, sterndrive and outboard motors were most common type of propulsion.

Outboard motors were favored by respondents living in a non bordering Connecticut town. Similarly, a slightly higher percent of out of state respondents used sterndrive boats than other users groups.

Respondents were also asked if the boat they used most often had a portable toilet or and installed toilet on board. If applicable they were to select a type from above. The majority of respondents (65%) did not respond to this question and another 20% actually wrote in something meaning none

or N/A. These two groups would be interpreted to mean 84.5% of boats most used by respondents did not have toilets. 12.1% reported having a portable toilet and only 2.4% reported having an installed toilet.

Average Hours Spent On the Water

Overall, respondents spent an average of 5.4 hours on the water on weekend days and only 4.3 hours on the water during a weekday. Average hours on the water varied greatly by user groups. This is most likely attributed to the effort required to make the boating trip on Candlewood Lake possible.

Lakefront respondents spent the fewest hours on the lake during weekends with an average of 3 hours. Out of state respondents and respondents traveling from non bordering Connecticut towns spent the greatest time on the water on weekends.

Primary Access to Candlewood Lake

Survey respondents were asked the primary method they used to access Candlewood Lake in 2009. The main access method for lakefront respondents was a private home they owned (62.4%). Another 15.9% of lakefront respondents accessed through a property owned by an association or club. Few respondents used a boat launch or marina. State launch use was most popular among out of state respondents and residents of non bordering Connecticut towns. Town owned boat launches and municipal marinas were most used by respondents residing in the towns bordering Candlewood Lake. Commercial marina use was least popular among lakefront respondents.

Question 9a asked respondents to place an "A" on the map of Candlewood Lake indicating where they primarily accessed the lake. This data was then placed into GIS program ArcGIS 9 and mapped to show the percent of respondents that accessed the lake by each zone. Zones were determined by Boating Division staff using geographic features of the lake and knowledge of boating routes and activities on the lake.

Overall, zones G, L, and M had the highest percentage of respondent reporting accessing the lake through them. Zone G includes Squantz Cove and Chatterton Point area, zone M includes Echo Bay, and zone L includes Lattin's Cove. See Map 1.1 through Map 1.5 in the appendix for more detailed information.

Areas of Candlewood Lake Respondents Boated In

Respondents were asked to identify areas on the map that they spent most of their time boating in during the 2009 season. After a GIS map was created, certain areas of the lake were reported to be used by respondents more than others. The most popular boating areas were zones I, G, and Q. See Map 2.1 in the appendix for additional details and table of results.

Activities while on Candlewood Lake

Some of the most popular activities respondents engaged in on Candlewood Lake were cruising/sightseeing and swimming from the boat. More than half of respondents reported engaging in these two activities. Tubing was the third most popular activity overall.

Activity preferences varied by user group. Although cruising/sightseeing was one of the most popular activities overall, a higher percentage of lakefront respondents (79%) and respondents whose residences bordered the lake (71%) engaged in this activity. With regard to fishing, a higher percentage of respondents from a non bordering Connecticut town (79%) or from out of state (38%) reported to engage in fishing. Fishing was only engaged in by 23% of lakefront residents.

Relatively few respondents (7.5%) reported engaging in sailing/windsurfing. However, it was more popular among lakefront respondents or respondents from towns bordering the lake.

Tubing was an activity conducted by about half of all user groups with the exception of non bordering Connecticut towns. Engaging in waterskiing and wakeboarding was most reported by lakefront users.

Section 2: Level of Satisfaction with Use of Candlewood Lake

Overall, 60% of survey respondents felt satisfied or very satisfied with their 2009 Candlewood Lake Experience. Another 19% had a neutral feeling about their satisfaction. Ultimately, only 13% of respondents were dissatisfied or very dissatisfied with their experience. Respondents from non bordering Connecticut towns and out of state respondents had the highest satisfaction; 71.2% and 70.9% respectively. Lakefront respondents were most dissatisfied with their 2009 experience.

Modifications to Boating Behavior

When asked, 16% of survey respondents reporting making no change or modification to their boating activities due to problems experienced in 2009. Another 9% provided no response to the question. The remaining survey respondents made one or more modification to their boating behavior.

The most common change overall was boating during off peak hours, either earlier or later in the day or on weekdays as opposed to weekends. Out of state respondents made this change the least.

What Respondents Liked the Most about Candlewood Lake

When given the opportunity to report what the respondent liked the most about this boating season, the most common response (21.1%) was the respondent enjoyed the times the lake was quiet.

Another 13.6% of respondents reported enjoying the natural beauty or peacefulness of Candlewood Lake the most. This feeling was most common among lakefront respondents. The fishery of the lake was most liked by 12.1% of all respondents. 56.3% of respondents from non bordering Connecticut towns like the fishery the most and only 1.8% of lakefront residents reporting the fishery of the lake as their most liked feature.

Lakefront and town bordering Candlewood Lake respondents liked the general recreational boating opportunities more than out of state and non border Connecticut town respondents. General recreational boating opportunities included comments suggesting respondents liked the suitability of the lake for water sports, cruising, and general boating.

What Respondents Disliked the Most about Candlewood Lake

Among all dislikes regarding the respondents' 2009 Candlewood Lake season the most common response was that the lake was crowded or congested. 16.6% of respondents disliked the crowding the most. Out of state respondents were the least likely to report congestion as their main dislike. In question 9d, respondents were asked to identify areas of the lake that they felt were routinely congested and interfered with their enjoyment of the lake. See Map 3.1 in the Appendix for additional details and table.

Poor water quality, large boats, other users' behaviors, noise, and wake from vessels were other things that respondents disliked the most.

Recreational Related Issues

Question 11 of the survey asked respondents to rank certain recreational issues identified by the DEP as 'not a problem', a 'minor problem' or 'a major problem'. Twenty-two issues were presented to respondents. The issues with the highest percentage of respondents feeling it was a major problem were: milfoil reducing enjoyment of the lake, size of vessels, horsepower of vessels, and unsafe operation of other boats.

Issues that were perceived as not being a problem by respondents were: seaplane activity, access to the lake, unmarked boating hazards, crowding at anchorages, and lack of dock facilities.

Some issues were perceived as more of a problem to lakefront respondents than other users groups. Noise from PWC and other boats was one of these. Lakefront respondents also felt damage to boats, docks, and other property by excessive wakes was a major problem more often then other user groups. Similarly, lakefront and town bordering Candlewood Lake respondents felt unsafe operation of other boaters was a greater problem than out of state and non border Connecticut town respondents.

While reviewing preliminary survey results it was discussed that two items had an ambiguous nature. The daytime and nighttime speed limit items left room for question. If a respondent felt there was a minor or major problem with the speed limit, it is possible the respondent's perceived problem could be that the limit is too high or too low. It was intended that if an individual thought there was a problem, it would be that the speed limit was too high. Careful wording will be used in future surveys.

Lake Patrols by Law Enforcement

When asked to rate the quantity of lake patrols by DEP Encon Police and the Candlewood Lake Authority about half (48.7%) felt there should be no change in patrols. Slightly less than half of respondents (45.1%) felt a need for additional law enforcement patrols on the lake. Only 3% of respondents felt patrols should be reduced.

In a related question, number 11, 37.1% of respondents felt more law enforcement patrols would help deal with problems they experienced in 2009 (see Table 9.1 on page 12).

Proposed Management Actions

The survey proposed a number of management actions and respondents were asked if they thought any of these actions should be considered to deal with the problems they experienced on Candlewood Lake in 2009. Only 3.5% of respondents did not answer the question. 12.1% of respondents felt that the existing management actions and regulations were sufficient. The rest of the respondents suggested one or more of the actions should be considered.

About 56% of survey respondents felt that a vessel size limit would be an appropriate management action. Lakefront respondents felt the strongest about enacting a limit (66.4%) followed by respondents from towns bordering the lake (56.3%) and those from non border Connecticut towns (41.4%). Only a small percentage (4.2%) of out of state respondents felt a vessel size limit should be enacted.

A horsepower limit, decreasing the nighttime speed limit, and slow no wake zoning were also popular management actions based on the overall population of survey respondents.

In addition to the list above, about 31% of respondents took the opportunity to write in an 'other' management action not already mentioned. These responses were read and categorized. While only a small amount of respondents wrote in an open ended response, two stood out as having the most respondents suggest them. Noise control and decreasing the number of out of town/state boaters were both suggested by 10% of respondents as other actions that should be considered. Table 9.2 on the following page contains all responses and the frequency they were suggested.







Percent of Respondents That Consider Lake Zone to be Routinely Congested







Are there any other recreation related issues you are concerned about that you think we should be aware of?

I was on my boat on 9/8/09 (tues following labor day) with a few others on CL. I have a slip at chatterton marina, which is closed on Tuesdays. Upon returning to my slip, I found another boat had parked there, leaving me stranded. I called local police who referred me to CLA & CLA said to call DEP & local police. DEP said to call local police. So, I really got the run-a-round. Finally was lucky enough to reach marina owner who helped hours later. CLA patrols are especially necessary when the lake is not crowded to assist in emergencies when there is no one else available!

boats brought in for the day should be checked for foreign life forms - i.e. weeds,bugs etc. So we could avoid the spread (like milfoil)

The lack of use is an embarrassment to visitors to my home on weekends. We cannot visit my nephew by boat due to the overwhelming number of boats rafting in his cove.

Fishermen, actually racing boats used as an excuse for fishing leave lures and fishing line all over our property. I've had to have my own outboard repaired due to fishing line on the lower unit. No one needs \$1000,000 worth of equipment to catch a fish on Candlewood Lake. Violations by seadoos and all sorts of watercraft occur with extreme frequency in our area. Particularly on weekends. A CLA docking facility in our immediate area never left the docks to enforce any violations. Accidents are more and more frequent, some are now fatal. Unauthorized and illegal use of rights of way contribute more overuse of the lake. Marinas pollute the lake with acid and petroleum nothing is being done by either local or state agencies to stop any of the above abuses.
